Construction planned in 2026 for the anticipated Gull Lake Regional Trail

Lacombe County is excited to announce the construction of the Gull Lake Regional Trail, a 14-kilometre pathway that will transform recreation opportunities and strengthen connections between communities around Gull Lake. Approved as part of the 5-Year Recreation Capital Plan, this project will be built in three phases, with Phase 1 starting this summer.

"This trail is more than just a recreational project—it's about creating connections," said Bill Cade, Lacombe County's Director of Operations. "It will link communities, provide safe and scenic routes for residents and visitors, and enhance the overall quality of life in Lacombe County."

THREE PHASES OF DEVELOPMENT

The project will roll out in stages:

- **Phase 1 (Spring 2026):** Construction begins on key sections that provide immediate connectivity between major access points.
- **Phase 2 (2027):** Expansion to link additional subdivisions and recreational areas.
- **Phase 3 (2028*):** Completion of the full trail loop, ensuring seamless access for residents and visitors.

**If needed*

Once complete, the trail will connect Bentley and Sandy Point on the west with Alberta Parks, Ebeling Subdivision, and the Summer Village of Gull Lake to the south, and extend to McLaurin, New Saratoga, and Wilson's Beach on the east.

A COLLABORATIVE EFFORT

The success of this project is built on strong partnerships. Lacombe County is working closely with the Summer Village of Gull Lake and Alberta Parks to ensure the trail reflects a shared vision of accessible, sustainable outdoor spaces.

"The Summer Village of Gull Lake is thrilled to be part of this initiative," said Tim DeVries, Public Works Manager for the Summer Village of Gull Lake. "The new trail will give residents and visitors an incredible way to experience the beauty of our lake while promoting active, healthy lifestyles."

BENEFITS FOR THE REGION

The Gull Lake Regional Trail will:

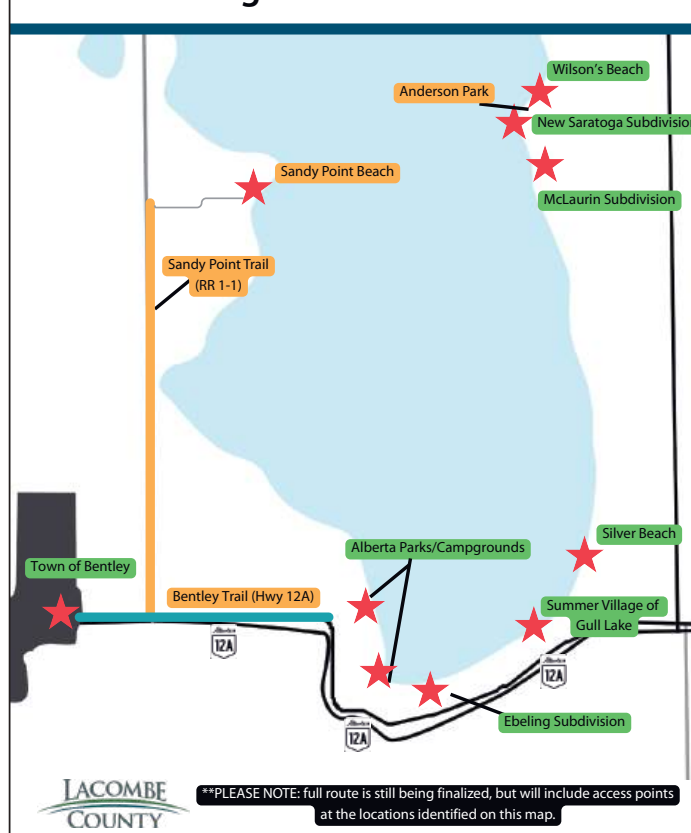
- Offer a scenic route for walking, cycling, and outdoor activities.

ASSESSMENT 101

What you need to know

FREQUENTLY ASKED QUESTIONS

1. What value is reflected in my assessment?

For assessment purposes in Alberta, most properties must meet a valuation standard of "Market Value". Cost and sales comparison approaches to value properties are primarily used in Lacombe County to determine market values. The physical characteristics and condition as of December 31 is the basis while the value is reflected as of July 1 the year prior to taxation. 'Regulated' rates established by the Provincial government are used to value farmland and machinery & equipment properties. Properties containing the necessary elements to be considered 'farm' or 'machinery & equipment' are typically a blend of market value and regulated rates. The elements necessary for these classifications are set by the Province.

2. Development and/or safety code permits were not issued for the build or development on my property does this mean it is not assessed and taxed?

Even though permits were not issued, an assessment of the property must still be prepared. Planning and Development are subject to different parts of the Municipal Government Act then Assessment and Taxation of property. Planning and Development sets out the permitted or allowable uses; however, the assessment prepared is based on what is actually occurring and existing on a property. Assessors record and reflect the actual use and physical condition of all buildings/improvements on the property when preparing assessments. All existing properties are reviewed on a cycle to ensure all buildings and improvements are considered in a property's valuation.

3. An Assessor visited my property toward the end of last year and collected information about my property including a building that's still under construction. Is

an assessment prepared even though part of my property isn't complete?

Properties with new construction, progressive buildings, or changes in use are tracked and reviewed annually. Permits may help Assessors to identify the properties requiring a year end inspection. In the event a construction or development project takes multiple years to complete, the Municipal Government Act instructs Assessors to evaluate the portion of the project in place as of December 31.

4. I received a letter asking information about my property, do I have to respond?

There are several details about your property including the activity that occurs on it that are necessary for an Assessor to fairly classify and evaluate your property. If you are curious as to why the information asked for is necessary, please call the Assessor and have a conversation with him or her. Provincial legislation requires property owners to submit this information. A property's owner ability to have their assessment complaint heard by an assessment review board may be impacted if the information is not provided in a timely manner. If you received a survey and have not replied by the response date stated on the survey, you may still send it to us. The information will be reviewed but the information may not be included in the coming assessment roll. As of December 31, all but one "Request for Information" surveys are beyond their response periods.

NOTICE OF INSPECTIONS Lacombe County Municipal Assessors are reviewing and visiting properties throughout the municipality throughout the year as required to verify property information ensuring accurate and equitable assessments – we appreciate your cooperation with data collection activities. Our Assessors carry identification and will present it upon request. If you have questions or concerns, don't hesitate to get in touch with us at the Lacombe County Administration Office.

SAFETY FIRST

Lacombe County reminds you to burn safely all year round

Lacombe County Fire Service reminds residents that although fire permits are not required between November 1 and February 28, there are still crucial safety expectations for any controlled burns conducted outside of the official fire season.

"Any burning must be done in a safe and controlled manner. We all must practice responsible burning throughout the year, even if fire permits aren't required," said Dave Bain, Manager of Fire and Emergency Services. "Lacombe County reserves the right to invoice residents for fire department responses to fires that are not compliant with these regulations."

FIRE PROTECTION AND SAFETY GUIDELINES

Under Lacombe County's Fire Protection Bylaw, fire permits are required from March 1 to October 31 each year. Although permits aren't mandatory from November 1 to February 28, safety remains essential for the well-being of residents and the environment. To ensure a safe burn, follow these guidelines:

- **Check the Weather:** Always monitor the forecast. Avoid burning on windy days, as gusts can quickly escalate a small fire into a wildfire.
- **Clear a Safe Zone:** Create a 10-foot safe area around your burn site, free from flammable materials like dry grass or leaves.
- **Have Equipment Ready:** Keep a hose, water source, and fire-control tools on hand, and never leave a fire unattended.
- **No Household Garbage:** Only burn clean, dry wood or vegetation. Never burn household garbage, plastics, or chemicals.
- **Keep it Small:** Maintain a manageable fire size to stay in control.
- **Responsible Supervision:** An adult should

oversee the fire at all times, and everyone present should know how to dial 911 in an emergency.

- **Respect Neighbours:** Be mindful of smoke and embers, which can disturb nearby properties.

IMPORTANT REGULATIONS:

Even when permits aren't required, certain regulations apply:

- Smoke should not cross major roadways or disturb neighbouring properties.
- Wind speeds must be under 15 km/hour.
- If a passerby calls 911, Fire Services must attend the scene to verify it is a non-emergency.

FOREST AND PRAIRIE PROTECTION ACT REQUIREMENTS

Additionally, Section 22 of the Forest and Prairie Protection Act remains in effect year-round, stating that no person shall:

- Light an outdoor fire without first taking precautions to control it at all times.
- Light an outdoor fire when weather conditions could cause it to spread.
- Fail to take reasonable steps to prevent the fire from spreading beyond their property.
- Leave any burning materials in a place where they could ignite other matter.
- Conduct activities with fire in a forest protection area without exercising reasonable care.

In addition, the Forest and Prairie Protection Act states that:

- Burning must not create physical discomfort to neighbours and impair visibility on roadways.
- There shall be a minimum 15-meter guard cleared of flammable materials around the

debris pile.

- Before windrows or piles of brush or debris can be burned:
 - Where the debris is a result of land clearing, debris windrows can be no longer than 60 meters in length with 8-meter breaks between each 60-meter windrow.
 - No windrow can be closer than 25 meters to uncleared land or standing hazardous fuels.
 - They must be separated from parallel windrows by **at least 15 meters**.

PERMITTED AND PROHIBITED MATERIALS

Only certain materials are permitted for open burning:

- **Permitted:** Brush, fallen trees, straw, grass, weeds, leaves, clean wood waste, cardboard, and paper products.
- **Not Permitted:** Preserved wood, automobile parts, tires, rubber, plastics, used oil, manure, pathological waste, asphalt shingles, and any materials prohibited by the Environmental Protection and Enhancement Act.

"We want to emphasize that no garbage of any sort can be burned, regardless of the time of year," emphasized Bain. "We have easily accessible landfills for anyone who needs to dispose of their garbage properly, ensuring that our air, water and land don't become contaminated."

Anyone caught burning garbage will be fined \$250 for the first offence, \$500 for the second offence, and \$1000 for the third offence.

Mirror Dog Tags

A license is required for all dogs in Mirror. Lacombe County has a flexible dog-tag licensing system for residents of Mirror. Any new licenses issued will be valid for the lifetime of the dog. Existing licenses will remain valid until renewal, at which point dog owners must obtain a lifetime tag under the new structure.

Lifetime license fees:

- \$25 – Dog that is both altered and microchipped
- \$75 – Dog that is either altered or microchipped
- \$150 – Dog that is unaltered and not microchipped
- \$15 – Replacement dog tag

If you receive a violation notice under the Dog Control Bylaw, you can pay it within 30 days to receive a 50% discount; after that period, the full penalty applies.

To order your new tag or view full bylaw details, visit lacombecounty.com/dogcontrol or call 403-782-8959.

Lacombe County will issue a tag for each dog, which must be attached to a collar worn by the dog at all times. Lacombe County Enforcement Officers will do checks to ensure compliance.

Mirror residents reminded to shovel sidewalks

Residents in Mirror are reminded that all snow and ice must be removed from their sidewalks within 48 hours of a snowfall, pursuant to Bylaw 1098/09.

Should the County have to pay for an employee or contractor to clear the snow/ice from a property, the occupant or owner will be charged for the cost and may face additional fines.



OPERATIONS

Your Roads Explained: Snow Removal in Lacombe County

Every winter, Lacombe County is responsible for keeping more than 2,000 kms of paved and gravel roads safe and passable. Our crews work hard after each snowfall to clear snow and ice in a timely, efficient, and safe manner.

Because every storm is different, snow removal timelines depend on both the severity and duration of the snowfall—but our goal remains the same: to maintain roads to reasonable winter driving conditions as soon as possible.

PAVED ROADS

Order of Priority

1. County-designated Primary Main Roads
2. County-designated Secondary Main Roads
3. Main access roads leading to subdivisions
4. Hamlets and Subdivisions

Our goal is to clear snow and ice from paved roads as quickly as possible while minimizing backtracking and travel time. Under normal winter conditions, we strive to have all paved roads maintained within 12 hours after a snowfall ends.

Note: All numbered highways in Lacombe County (e.g., Highway 2A, 12, 20 or 597) are maintained by Alberta Transportation through their contractor Mainroad Alberta.

GRAVEL ROADS

Order of Priority

1. Local Roads – Snow removal begins in alternating areas to ensure fairness. Crews work in a sequence that reduces unnecessary grader travel.
2. Public Access and Machinery Roads – Opened to established residences or for agricultural transport when possible and when conditions allow.
3. Winging Snow and Other Maintenance – Performed once primary snow removal is complete.

Snow removal typically begins when snow accumulation reaches about 5 cms. The goal is to have the entire gravel road system cleared within four



days after a snowfall, depending on the storm's severity and duration.

All gravel roads in Lacombe County are designated school bus routes, meaning they receive equal priority during snow clearing.

PRIVATE PROPERTY

Lacombe County **does not clear snow from private driveways or yards.**

Residents who need this service can visit www.lacombecounty.com and search “area contractors” for a list of local snow removal providers.

A QUICK SAFETY REMINDER

When clearing your own property, **please do not push snow across County roads.**

This practice creates dangerous ridges and icy patches that can cause collisions and damage equipment.

Did You Know?

Lacombe County maintains more than **2,000 kms of roads** each winter — that’s roughly the same distance as driving from Lacombe to Thunder Bay, Ontario!

Each storm brings unique challenges for our crews. Depending on snowfall amounts, wind, and temperatures, it can take anywhere from **12 hours to four days** to return roads to reasonable winter driving conditions.

WINTER TIPS

Let's work together to keep roads clear and safe this winter!

- ✓ Shovel an extra space to the left of your driveway
- ✓ Shovel snow to the right side of your driveway (the same direction as plows).

NEVER push snow across the road or into ditches — it can cause safety hazards, flooding, and road damage.



When clearing your driveway after a snowfall, clear an extra area to the left of your driveway. This gives County graders a place to push snow, helping you avoid a pile at the end of your driveway when roads are cleared.

Don't push snow across the road or into ditches/right-of-way. Doing so can:

- Create unsafe conditions for

- motorists and graders
- Slow down snow removal
- Damage roads, equipment, or buried utilities
- Contribute to spring flooding

Best practice: Shovel snow to the right side of your driveway — the same direction County plows travel. It keeps things safer and saves you from extra work later!

IMPORTANT BRIDGE RESTRICTIONS

HWY 50 over Parlby Creek

Bridge Restrictions are in place on Highway 50 over Parlby Creek (BF 1423, near Tees) following a recent inspection by Alberta Transportation. The inspection found significant structural issues, including broken stirrups and concrete deterioration.

CURRENT RESTRICTIONS ARE IN PLACE:

- Speed limit reduced – from 100 km/h to 60 km/h across the bridge.
- Load limits were revised, and updated postings are in effect on-site (heavier vehicles will be restricted).

Please slow down, follow posted signs, and plan your route accordingly when travelling through this area.

SPRING 2026 SCHOOL PROGRAMS

The Centre is officially planning and preparing for another exciting season filled with outdoor learning and interactive workshops. ALUS WINTER GRAZING UPDATE

The cattle are also back at the Nature Centre from November to February for year 2 of our ALUS Winter Pasture Grazing Rejuvenation Project. The goal of this project is to improve forage production and soil health through the addition of manure and straw bedding. These improvements will act as a natural fertilizer while armouring the soil surface against erosion and help retain moisture.

WINTER BIRDS

We are enjoying watching our feeder station and the diversity it offers. We are still seeing Ameri-



can Goldfinches and the Redpolls arrived shortly before Christmas; we are also seeing Boreal Chickadees, Pine Grosbeaks, and White-Breasted and Red-Breasted Nuthatches. It is a wonderful reminder that even during the colder months, Ellis is still full of life and activity.

Grain Bag and Twine Recycling in Lacombe County

Grain Bag Recycling



Details:

This service is offered free of charge to agriculture producers operating within Lacombe County. The grain bags will be rolled and collected on farm site for eventual delivery to a plastic recycling center in Alberta.

Requirements:

- Agriculture producers who request grain bag recycling services must provide one individual on site, capable of assisting the rolling and collection operation.
- Grain bags **MUST BE FREE** of grain, mud, dirt debris, and vermin.
- To ensure used grain bags are eligible for recycling, grain bag collection services should be scheduled within one week of grain extraction.
- Grain bag collection services are offered free of charge.

Twine Recycling



Details:

Producers can pick up Clean Farms Twine Recycling Bags at any Lacombe Regional Waste Services Commission Transfer Site during regular business hours. Twine will only be accepted if it is placed in the Clean Farms Twine Recycling Bag, and then brought to the collection site.

Requirements:

- 1. Shake** – Remove as much debris, snow or ice as possible. Excessively dirty twine may be rejected, or subject to a landfill tipping fee or additional charges at drop off.
- 2. Bag** – Place loose twine in a Clean Farms Twine Recycling Bag and tie bags to close. Please do not knot the twine. Clean Farms Twine Recycling bags are available free of charge at any Lacombe Regional Waste Services Commission Transfer Sites.
- 3. Return** – Return to a Lacombe Regional Waste Services Commission Transfer Site during regular business hours.

Call for ALUS Projects for 2026: *Make 2026 your year for conservation*

Do you want to join the hundreds of farmers and ranchers across Alberta and Canada, in growing a new product – “**Ecosystem Services**” – and getting paid for it?

We are once again looking for Lacombe County farmers and ranchers who want to do ALUS Projects on their operations in 2026.

With ALUS, you can apply for **50% of the total value** of establishing a project – things like riparian management fencing, alternative livestock watering systems, native shelterbelts, buffer zones between crops and wetlands, and much more.

PLUS, with ALUS, you can qualify for up to **\$100 per acre per year**, for your ongoing management that produces ecosystem services.

In 2026, ALUS Lacombe is looking to work with farmers and ranchers to restore, enhance or conserve the environmental functions of natural water bodies, riparian areas, forests and treed areas, open pastures and native pollinator habitat.

Eligible ALUS projects include:

- Installing a new Watering System to give livestock water in a trough on high ground away from water bodies
- Installing new fencing to enable ecological grazing management of riparian areas, forests, and rangeland
- Moving livestock winter feeding and bedding sites away from natural water bodies
- Farming around seasonal wetlands
- Creating perennial forage buffer zones between annual crops and water bodies
- Planting native trees and shrubs to enhance over-mature forest areas
- Planting native shelterbelts and eco-buffers
- Planting native flowering plants for our native pollinators.

Long Range Planning Program



WE HAVE ANSWERS

Every year, the County updates its Long Range Planning Program to give the public a snapshot of when County plans will be updated. This article provides an overview of the 2026-2028 Long Range Planning Program.

WHAT IS THE LONG RANGE PLANNING PROGRAM?

Lacombe County's Long Range Planning Program outlines the schedule that the County will follow in developing or updating plans for the areas in the County that have been identified for future residential, recreational, commercial and industrial development. Lacombe County Council recently adopted the 2026-2028 Long Range Planning Program, which will guide the workplan over the next three years.

WHAT TYPES OF PROJECTS ARE CONSIDERED IN THE LONG RANGE PLANNING PROGRAM?

Projects considered in the Long Range Planning Program include the following:

- **Intermunicipal Development Plans:** Plans developed with neighbouring municipalities to coordinate collaborative land use planning that results in joint success
- **Area Structure Plans:** Land use planning documents that focus on specific areas in the County
- **Economic Development Strategy and projects:** outlines initiatives to attract investment in the local economy and promote economic growth and development in Lacombe County
- **Special Projects:** This could include County-wide consultation on certain regulations in the Municipal Development Plan or Land Use Bylaw, or annexation projects

WHAT PLANS AND PROJECTS ARE INCLUDED IN THE 2026-2028 LONG RANGE PLANNING PROGRAM?

The 2026-2028 Long Range Planning Program includes a variety of plans and projects. In the following section, you can read an overview of the plans and projects beginning in each of the next three years.

2026

Hamlet of Mirror Area Structure Plan Update: Background review work for the plan update began in 2025, and staff will continue to work

on the update through 2026 and into 2027. This plan update aims to revisit development policies in the Hamlet and is vital to defining the community's growth and development.

Economic Development Strategy Update:

This project continues from 2025, with staff completing an in-house update of the Economic Development Strategy. So far, the Economic Development Strategy has resulted in a finalized business retention and attraction plan and has made progress in initiatives such as the County's Success Grows Here! Films, a business directory and increased marketing.

Town of Eckville/Lacombe County

Intermunicipal Development Plan Update:

An update to the plan is proposed in 2026, in partnership with the Town of Eckville. The plan update will ensure that the plan is up to date with the community's vision and is reflective of ongoing infrastructure upgrades in the area.

Town of Bentley/Lacombe County

Intermunicipal Development Plan Update: In partnership with the Town of Bentley, an update to the plan is proposed in 2026. An update is required to reflect the Town's new boundaries created under the Town's recently approved **annexation**.

Lacombe Lake Management Plan:

In partnership with the City of Lacombe and Town of Blackfalds, the County will embark on creating a Lacombe Lake Management Plan this year. The development of this plan is needed as it is required by the Town of Blackfalds Water Act Approval for their northwest area stormwater management system. Although the plan is triggered by the Town's system, the subject lands fall within Lacombe County. As the project managing municipality, Lacombe County submitted an application to Alberta Municipal Affairs for an Intermunicipal Collaboration grant, through the Alberta Community Partnership Program. If we successfully receive funding in 2026, the grant will be used to develop the plan in partnership with the other two municipalities.

Red Deer County Annexation:

In 2026, Lacombe County intends to submit an annexation application to correct a boundary inconsistency between Lacombe County and Red Deer County. The subject lands include nine quarter sections in Red Deer County along Township Road 39-0, between Range Road 2-1 and Range Road 3-0. This boundary is an anomaly, because the northern quarters within the subject lands fall within Lacombe County.

2027

QEII North of Lacombe Area Structure Plan Update:

An update to the plan is proposed in 2027. The plan was last updated in 2017. An update is required to ensure the plan maintains consistency with the County's existing planning policies, reflects the economic development strategy, and aligns with the vision of the community.

Gull Lake Intermunicipal Development Plan Update:

An update to the plan is proposed in 2027, subject to the willingness of the partner municipalities to participate. The plan was adopted in 2019, and a review has been requested by a developer.

Village of Clive Intermunicipal Development Plan Update:

An update to the plan is proposed in 2027, subject to the willingness of the Village of Clive to participate. The Plan was initially adopted in 2018 and is due for review in 2027.

2028

Sylvan Lake Intermunicipal Development Plan Update:

An update to the plan is proposed in 2028, subject to the willingness of partner municipalities to participate. The Sylvan Lake Intermunicipal Development Plan was initially adopted in 2021, with a review to be considered every five years.

Ponoka County/Lacombe County

Intermunicipal Development Plan Update: An update to the plan is proposed in 2028, subject to Ponoka County's willingness to participate. The Plan was initially adopted in 2020, with a review to be considered after three years.

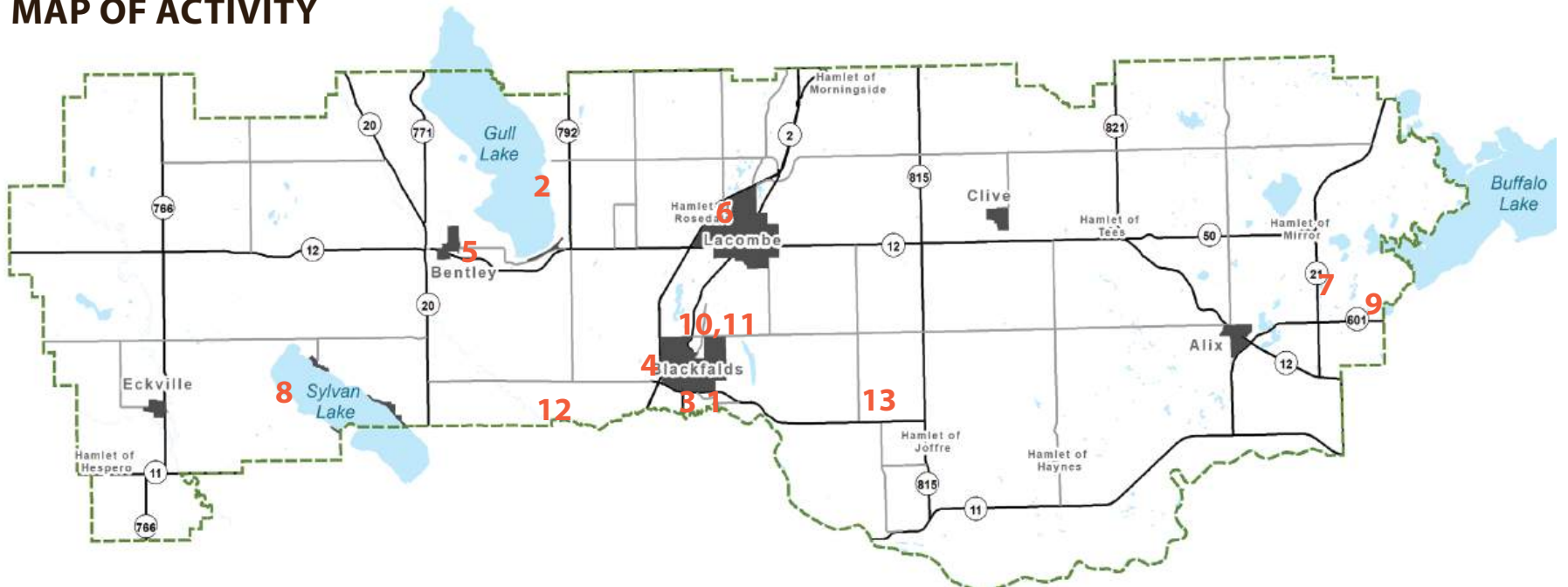

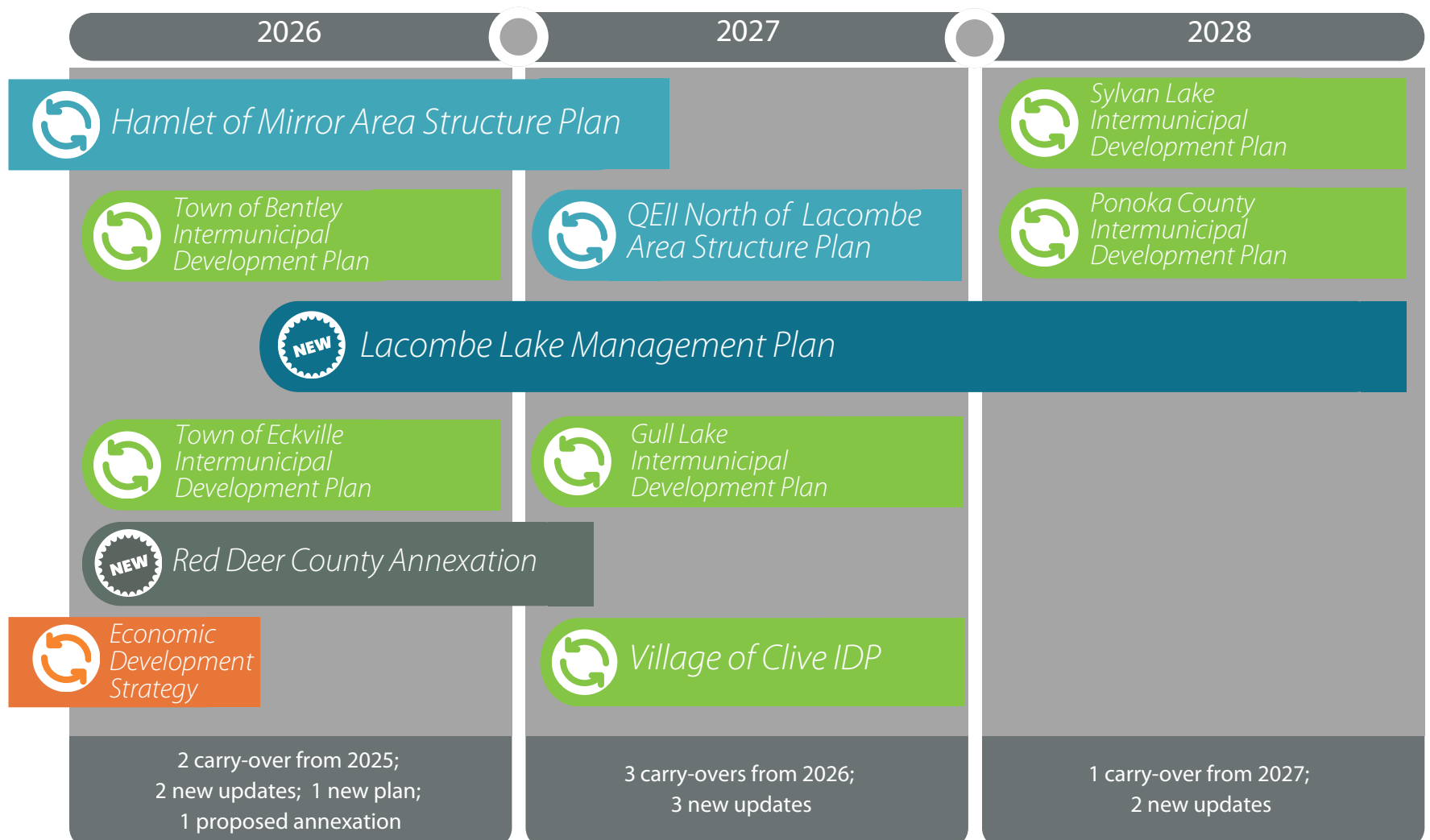

Economic Development: What's new in 2026

Economic Development in Lacombe County is entering 2026 with a clear focus: supporting local businesses, strengthening our labour market and workforce, and working alongside neighbouring municipalities and regional partners to position the area for long-term, sustainable growth.

Whether you operate a farm, a home-based business, a shop, or a large industrial operation, Economic Development plays a role in helping businesses succeed. This year brings several new and refreshed initiatives designed to better serve our community.

What's New in 2026? This year marks an important step forward with the introduction of several new tools and programs.

An Economic Development Committee will be established to provide strategic guidance, industry insight, and local perspectives to help shape priorities and ensure initiatives remain aligned with the needs of Lacombe County businesses.

THE LEATHER LOFT

30 Years of Craftsmanship and Community

Tucked away along Rainy Creek Road in Lacombe County, The Leather Loft has long been a hidden gem where traditional craftsmanship and rural creativity come together. For more than 30 years, owner and leatherworker Gail Cook has built a reputation for quality, comfort and authenticity, handcrafting pieces that have been specially designed for each buyer's needs.

Gail's journey into leatherwork began with formal training at Olds College, followed by hands-on experience working for an accomplished saddlemaker. In 1994, she launched her own business, taking on repair work and gradually expanding into custom leather pieces, including saddles, tack, belts, purses, holsters, and specializing in chaps and chinks.

"The goal was always to achieve fit, form, and function," says Gail. "Whether it was built for the arena or the pasture, I wanted it to work properly, and I think I accomplished that."

For 25 years in business, Gail has operated The Leather Loft from Lacombe County, where she found strong community support and the freedom to build a rural-based business on her own terms. Early on, most customers were local riders and ranchers who discovered her work through print ads, word of mouth, and a simple sign at the end of her driveway.

As technology evolved, so did The Leather Loft! A website and a social media presence opened the door to a much wider audience, bringing customers from across Canada and internationally. Today, Gail's handcrafted pieces have been

shipped throughout Europe, Australia, and the United States, once again proving that quality craftsmanship travels far beyond rural borders.

In 2023, Gail's work received international recognition as she entered a pair of chinks in the World Leather Debut in Sheridan, Wyoming. Competing against some of the top leatherworkers in the world, her entry earned second place. An achievement that reflected decades of skill, precision, and dedication to the craft.

That recognition has also been felt closer to home. While Gail has long been supported by the local community, her talent was recently acknowledged in a special way when Cilantro and Chive in Lacombe selected her as a featured local artist, showcasing her work as a tribute to her craftsmanship and legacy.

Over the past year, Gail has begun shifting her focus from full-time work in the shop to dedicating more time to riding her two horses and competing in Cowboy Mounted Shooting. While she is no longer taking custom orders, she remains creatively engaged through a variety of meaningful projects. She recently donated a handcrafted pair of chinks to a local non-profit, which were raffled off as a fundraiser and continues to work on select pieces, including headstalls. A custom tree is on order for a new saddle of her own.

Recognizing a lack of accessible learning opportunities for those interested in leatherwork, Gail has also begun offering classes, an initiative that was well-received and may continue in the future.

Reflecting on her career, Gail is grateful for the

path she chose and the people she met along the way. "I feel blessed to have worked in the leatherworking and equine industry and to have met so many like-minded people who shared her passion for all things horses," she says. "And when I look out my shop windows every day at the Sunset Hills west of Bentley, I believe there couldn't have been a prettier place to do it from."

After three decades in business, Gail Cook and The Leather Loft represent the very best of rural entrepreneurship, showing that when skill, heart, and community come together, the results are truly special.

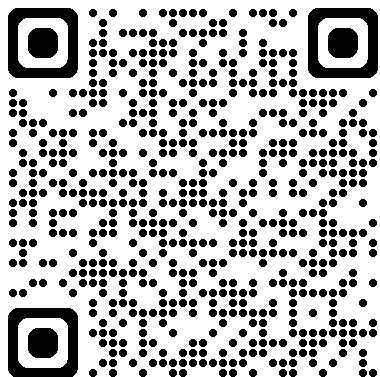

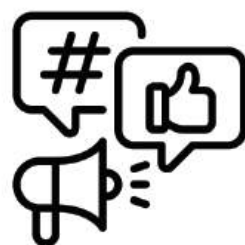

Lacombe County is committed to strengthening the quality of life for residents and fostering civic pride by providing financial support for community programs, events and activities.

Policy RC(9) - County Support of Community Programs, Events and Activities provides additional support for organizations in the County and its urban municipalities, as well as for the municipalities themselves. Support will be given for events and activities which are held for the benefit and enjoyment of the general public, demonstrate a financial need, and other criteria explained in the policy.

The application deadline is February 1, 2026; applicants will be advised by March 31, 2026 of the status of their application.

Policy Guidelines/Procedures:

Eligibility: Urban municipalities within the County, and community organizations in the urban municipalities within the County and within Lacombe County are eligible for funding, subject to the following guidelines:

To be eligible for consideration, programs:

- Must demonstrate a need for financial support from the County;
- Must be held for the enjoyment and benefit of the general public;
- Must be hosted on an annual basis and/or recognize significant milestone events;
- Must not charge an admission, entrance or registration fee for the program, event or activity;
- Must receive at least an equivalent amount of funding from the urban municipality in which the program, event or activity is being held as that being requested from the County;
- Must receive at least an equal amount of funding from the community organization if the program, event or activity is being held in the County; and
- Must take place in the County, or in the urban municipalities within the County in 2026

The following are not eligible for support under this policy:

- Capital facilities and equipment;







- Youth and adult sports teams and associated programs, events and activities;
- School reunions;
- Private functions;
- Community organizations, programs, events and activities that receive support from the County through other programs or policies.

Funding Allotment & Allocation:

Funding will be based on \$0.75 per capita based on the current year official population of Lacombe County and the urban municipalities within the County, with a \$1,000 minimum allotment per town or village, and a \$500 minimum allotment per summer village.


