

# Lacombe County Council approves 2025 operating and capital budgets

During the November 29, 2024 budget meeting, Lacombe County Council adopted the County's 2025 operating and capital budgets. Each year, Lacombe County Council and Administration meet to establish priorities that align with the County's Strategic Plan and multi-year operating and capital plans. For 2025, Council's focus was on continuing to deliver high levels of services to our ratepayers while maintaining fiscal responsibility.

"The 2025 budget reflects Council's commitment to maintaining service levels and addressing the needs of our community," said Michael Minchin, Director of Corporate Services. "Council voted to approve the capital and operating budgets for 2025, recognizing the challenges posed by inflation and ensuring that the County's operations are managed efficiently."

Each year, Council works through the complex task of managing resources to balance present needs and future growth.

"During our budget meetings, we have carefully considered the economic challenges and the needs of our community. This budget is a balanced approach to maintaining high service levels while planning for future growth," said Reeve Barb Shepherd. "Our 2025 budget reflects our commitment to fiscal responsibility and our dedication to providing consistent, high-quality services to our residents. We are focused on ensuring that Lacombe County remains a vibrant and thriving community, meeting the expectations of our ratepayers."

#### **2025 OPERATING BUDGET**

The \$81.8 million operating budget ensures the continuation of existing service levels with key adjustments for inflation and strategic initiatives. Highlights include:

- An estimated net cost of \$54,000 for the 2025 municipal election, held every four years.
- An additional \$30,000 in funding allocated to community FCSS programs to support local needs.
- Implementation of a new funding agreement with the Town of Blackfalds for fire services in the Blackfalds Fire District.
- A \$154,240 increase to the recreation capital assistance reserve, ensuring future recreation projects with urban partners are supported.
- A 3% inflationary increase to maintain recreation

- and cemetery facilities county wide, except where agreements apply.
- Continued investment in asset management, including an infrastructure locating project in the Hamlet of Mirror to assess underground utility conditions.
- Initiation of a water servicing study for the Hamlets of Morningside and Tees.

#### **2025 CAPITAL BUDGET**

The \$28.6 million capital budget focuses on essential infrastructure improvements and asset management, representing a 23.91% increase from 2024. Of the \$28.6 million in capital spending in 2025, \$14.51 million (50.75%) is sourced through funds set aside in prior years through the capital replacement plans. Key investments include:

- Significant road paving projects, including upgrades to Range Road 2-4 on the southwest side of Sylvan Lake.
- Utility infrastructure projects totaling \$3.6 million, featuring the \$3.46 million Tees Reservoir and Truck Fill Station to enhance water services.
- Continued funding for bridge replacements and maintenance, recreation facilities, and equipment upgrades to meet community needs.

#### **ABOUT THE BUDGET PROCESS**

It is important to note that Council is not formally approving the 2025 tax rates in adopting the budgets. There are two stages in setting the budgets:

- Stage 1: Developing and approving the operating and capital budgets each year in late November or early December. Approval of the 2025 budgets authorizes the County to incur expenditures and conduct its operations commencing January 1, 2025. The budgets are based on preliminary property assessment information and estimated requisition levies.
- Stage 2: Approving the 2025 tax rate bylaw in April or May, which will establish the current year's property tax rates by property type and give the County authority to prepare and issue property tax notices. This occurs in the spring, after the Province sets the property tax levy for education purposes and when property assessment values have been confirmed.

TIPP is a hassle-free way to pay your property taxes monthly, spreading payments over the year instead of making one lump sum in August.

Payments are automatically withdrawn from your bank account on the 15th of each month, helping you stay on budget and avoid costly late penalties:

- 6% penalty for unpaid taxes after August 31
- 10% penalty for unpaid taxes after December 31

#### **How TIPP Works:**

- Taxes are billed in May and cover the calendar year (January 1–December 31).
- Your monthly payment is calculated by dividing your most recent tax bill by 12
- Payments start January 15 and ensure your account is fully paid by December 15.

#### What you need to know:


- Property taxes are due annually on August 31
- Sign up for the Tax Installment Payment Plan (TIPP) before December 31, 2024
- If you missed the December 31st deadline, no worries; you can sign up in 2025 (before July 31). We will require you to pay the missed monthly amounts up front and then withdraw monthly payments.

# From steam to scale: Lacombe County resident Ernie Beskowiney's model train legacy

For Ernie Beskowiney, a Lacombe County resident, the chuff of a steam engine represents more than nostalgia; it's a testament to a lifetime of curiosity and craftsmanship. After completing the painstaking restoration of a 100-point car in 2002—a rare accolade marking the pinnacle of automotive restoration—Ernie felt he needed a new challenge. That's when he turned to model train engineering.

"I was ready to start another project," he recalls. "Model engineering seemed like a natural fit."

In September, Ernie's over twomile backyard track near Benalto came alive with the whistle and puffs of miniature steam engines, marking the culmination of nearly two decades of hard work and tens of thousands of hours. The event was more than a display—it was a celebration of Ernie's vision and a trial run to create a future fundraising venue for Alberta's children's hospitals in Calgary and Edmonton.

The inspiration for this project came from a deeply personal place. Sixteen years ago, during a challenging pregnancy, doctors expressed grave concerns about Ernie's grandson's development, fearing he might have severe physical and cognitive impairments, and recommended termination. However, his parents chose to continue with the pregnancy, and the baby was born with one kidney significantly smaller than the other. Thanks to the exceptional care provided by the Ottawa Children's Hospital, Ernie's grandson thrived and now dreams of pursuing a career in medicine.

During that difficult time, Ernie had a vivid dream about building a train track on the farm and using it



to host fundraising events for the hospital. It took him several days to share the dream with his wife, Dorinda, but when he finally did, she wholeheartedly supported the idea, saying, "That's a very doable dream." With her encouragement, the track designing and building project began.

Last fall's private event was a trial run for the larger fundraisers Ernie plans to host in support of Alberta's children's hospitals – the Stollery Children's Hospital in Edmonton and the Calgary Children's Hospital.

"It's a lot of work," he notes. "You need volunteers, fundraising, corporate sponsorship—it's a team effort." Despite the challenges, the event was a resounding success, with guests marveling at the sight of miniature steam engines in action.

Ernie is generously donating the use of his property and train equipment entirely free of charge. All donations and corporate sponsorships go directly to the hospitals. Alberta



hospital staff are onsite to collect donations from the public and corporations, ensuring that all funds and corporate cheques are directed to the chosen children's hospital of their choosing.

Beyond trains, Ernie's career has been a tapestry of mechanical expertise. He's a journeyman mechanic, a former automotive instructor in Regina, and a top-ranking Snap-On Tools distributor. These experiences shaped his approach to engineering, which combines precision, creativity, and a commitment to excellence.

"Building these to scale usually takes decades," he explains. "But I was focused and diligent."

His dedication culminated in the completion of his first locomotive in 2006. But Ernie wasn't content with off-the-shelf kits. "I wasn't happy with the results," he admits. "So, I started designing my own using original blueprints scaled down to the right size." Today, his meticulously crafted collection includes eight locomotives, two diesel-electric models inspired by Canadian Pacific Railway, and three grain cars, each bearing decals so precise they match the colors and logos of their full-sized counterparts. His Alberta grain car even features the Lacombe County logo.

His beautiful steam locomotive the famous CNR6060 4-8-2 Mountain class is a scale model of the 6060 that resides at Stettler. There is a YouTube video of him pulling over a hundred feet of train that has gone viral with over 38M views. Just use his name

to search on YouTube.

"I've always been drawn to steampowered machines," he says.
"There's something magical about them." That fascination led him to study intensely, devouring books, studying the original Railway Education Bureau correspondence course issued in 1944, and even achieving a knowledge level comparable to a railroad engineer. "I would spend two hours every morning studying steam," Ernie adds.

Ernie began work on his backyard track layout in the fall of 2015. Over the years, the project has grown to include more than three kilometers of track, a 60-meter-long tunnel with two tracks, a station house designed to double as a fundraising collection booth, a worktable for steam engines, and a hoist capable of lifting the 700-kilogram locomotives into storage racks.

Lacombe County has been supportive of his endeavors, approving a permit for his private railroad. While his train park isn't open to the public, Ernie finds ways to share his creations through events.

Ernie's journey—from a curious farm kid, that never got any store-bought toys and had to build his own, to a master model engineer—is as inspiring as the steam engines he builds. Through his trains, he not only celebrates the legacy of steam-powered machinery but also creates joy and purpose for his community.

- Women 75 and over: Can continue screening and should discuss the risks and benefits with their health care provider.

# **SAFETY FIRST**

# Fire Permits not required in Lacombe County: November 1 - February 28

Under Lacombe County's Fire Protection bylaw, fire permits are required between March 1 and October 31.

However, even when permits aren't mandatory (November 1 - February 28), it's crucial to prioritize safety for your sake and the environment.

Here's how to ensure a safe burn:

- Check the Weather: Always keep an eye on the weather forecast. Windy conditions can quickly escalate a small fire into a wildfire.
- 2. Clear a Safe Zone: Create a safe area around your burn site, free from flammable materials like dry grass or leaves. Maintain a 10-foot clearance.

- **3. Equipment Ready**: Have a hose, water source, and tools on hand to control the fire. Never leave the fire unattended.
- 4. NO Household Garbage: Only burn clean, dry wood or vegetation. NEVER burn household garbage, plastics, or chemicals. See our Fire Permits Section of the website for more information.
- Keep it Small: Stick to a manageable fire size. Large, uncontrolled fires are dangerous.
- Responsible Supervision: An adult should supervise the fire at all times, and everyone involved should know how to dial 911 in case of an emergency.
- 7. Respect Neighbours: Be mindful of your

neighbours. Smoke and embers can disrupt their peace.

Although Fire Permits are not required between November 1 and February 28 (or February 29, if it's a leap year), the public is reminded that:

- Smoke cannot cross any major roadways or disturb any neighbouring properties
- Wind speeds must be less than 15 kms/hour
- If a passerby calls 911, Fire Services are required to attend the scene to ensure a nonemergency.

Let's show our commitment to a safe and responsible community. Remember, even when permits aren't required, safety should always be a top priority. Spread the word and share the knowledge!

# Winter driving is here: What to consider when driving in winter conditions

Winter driving in Alberta can be treacherous. Blowing snow can make for white-out conditions and adding slick roads in the mix can be dangerous.

Alberta RCMP recommend the following tips to keep yourself safe during winter driving conditions:

#### Winter tires

According to tire experts, once the temperature drops below seven (7) degrees Celsius, all-season tires lose their grip and braking distance. While winter tires are not mandatory in Alberta, the RCMP and other local authorities do advise that all vehicles be equipped with four (4) good winter tires when driving in severe weather conditions.

#### Slow down

RCMP urge drivers to slow down when the conditions are not ideal. The posted speed limit is intended for ideal road conditions and motorists can be charged with a traffic offence if you drive too fast for the conditions.

#### Give yourself space on the road

Give yourself a greater distance between vehicles to allow your vehicle to stop safely if you have to suddenly hit the brakes.



#### **Emergency kit**

Every vehicle should have a winter survival kit. Some items to consider are:

- Warm winter gloves, toque and boots
- Blanket or extra clothing
- Bag of sand or kitty litter
- Small shovel
- Ice scraper and/or snow brush
- Booster cables
- Non-perishable food items
- Water bottles
- Extra windshield washer fluid
- · First Aid kit
- · Road maps (not just a GPS unit)
- · Flashlight and batteries
- Flares
- · Waterproof matches
- Battery jumper cables
- A fully-charged cellphone
- Tools
- · Fire extinguisher
- Duct tape



# Notice of Road Construction Lacombe County Winter **Road Maintenance**

Lacombe County has more than 2,000 km of paved and gravel roads to maintain through the winter. Time frames will vary depending on the severity and duration of a snowstorm.

#### **PAVED ROADS** - ORDER OF PRI-**ORITY FOR SNOW REMOVAL**

- County-designated Primary Main Roads
- County-designated Secondary Main Roads
- Hamlets and Subdivisions
- Main access roads to Subdivisions

The goal of winter maintenance for paved roads is to remove snow and ice from the road surface as quickly as possible. Lacombe County will undertake snow removal in a manner that minimizes backtracking or excessive travel. The basic service level that we strive for is to have all the paved roads maintained to reasonable winter conditions within 12 hours after a snowstorm: however. this will vary depending on the severity and the storm's duration.

PLEASE NOTE THAT ALL NUM-BERED HIGHWAYS IN THE COUN-TY ARE MAINTAINED BY ALBERTA TRANSPORTATION - CONTRACT-ED BY MAINROAD ALBERTA (1-877-875-3263)

#### **GRAVEL ROADS - ORDER OF PRI-ORITY FOR SNOW REMOVAL**

- Local Roads Snow removal will commence in alternating locations. Lacombe County will undertake snow removal in a manner that minimizes motor grader backtracking or excessive travel.
- Public access roads and machinery roads - Snow removal will only be undertaken to an established residence or to transport

- agricultural products, provided the road may be opened with a motor grader. This service will be subject to the availability of the equipment.
- Winging snow from the shoulders and other maintenance will have second priority.

The goal for winter maintenance for gravel roads is to remove snow from the road surface after accumulations reach approximately 5 cm or more. The basic service level that we strive for is to have the gravel road system maintained to reasonable winter conditions within four days after a snow storm; however, this will vary dependent on the severity and duration of the storm.

All gravel roads in Lacombe County are designated school bus routes; therefore, they are given equal prior-

# **ALUS Lacombe 2024 Highlights**

2024 has once again been a good year for ALUS in Lacombe County. Some numbers of note:

- 12 Lacombe County farmers / ranchers requested funding for on-farm projects that increase ecosystem services
- 9 Lacombe County farmers / ranchers completed their onfarm projects and enrolled a total of
- 121 additional acres into the ALUS Program in 2024
- \$50.862 was provided to the 9 ALUS Farmers in 2024, for cost-sharing on establishing their on-farm projects, and
- \$23,123 was also allocated for ALUS annual payments, which will be paid to the 9 ALUS Farmers over the next 5 years, for their ongoing management of their ALUS Projects that produces increased ecosystem services.
- 826 acres have been enrolled in ALUS by a total of 23 Lacombe County farmers / ranchers since ALUS began here

New 2024 ALUS Projects included Adaptive Multi-Paddock Grazing, Shelterbelts / Tree Planting, Alternative Livestock Watering, and Forest or Riparian Management Fencing.

ALUS works so well because it's "community-led and farmerdelivered". Part of that philosophy is that the decision-making in ALUS, is done by an ALUS Partnership Advisory Committee or "PAC". In Lacombe County, that committee is made up of Lacombe County farmers and ranchers. We were very pleased to have our PAC grow from 4 voting members to 6 in 2024. That said, we are always looking for additional members, please contact us if you're interested in 2025.

Another highlight from 2024 was working with Lacombe County on the Lacombe County Agriculture Tour. One of the stops was the Adaptive Multi-Paddock Grazing project at the Ellis Nature Centre.

#### The Next Generation Loan provides Next Generation Loan offers various

new, young and returning agricultural producers with a consistent source of fixed-rate term loans to establish their own farming operation.

Applicants must meet one of the following eligibility requirements:

- Under 40 at the time of application.
- Applicants who are over 40 years of age at the time of application, must meet the following eligibility requirements:
- Less than three years farming history,
- Farm income of less than \$10,000 for three of the last five years.
- In the case of joint applications, 20 per cent of members must be Next Generation borrowers
- In the case of corporation applications, 20 per cent of ownership must be Next Generation borrowers.

- terms up to 20 years with a maximum amortization of 35 years
- No annual fees
- Payment schedule to fit your cash flow with an option of up to five years of interest-only payments
- Prepay options available based on the interest term you select


#### **Next Generation Incentive**

At the time of application, applicants who qualified for the Next Generation Loan may be eligible for a one per cent interest rate reduction for a maximum of five years on the first term of the loan. The lifetime maximum borrowing for the Next Generation Incentive is \$1.5 million per individual


The Next Generation Incentive cannot be applied to housing, purchasing assets from a spouse or paying out an existing AFSC loan.



#### **Grain Bag and Twine Recycling in Lacombe County**

#### **Grain Bag Recycling**



#### **Details:**

This service is offered free of charge to agriculture producers operating within Lacombe County. The grain bags will be rolled and collected on farm site for eventual delivery to a plastic recycling center in Alberta.

#### **Requirements**:

- Agriculture producers who request grain bag recycling services must provide one individual on site, capable of assisting the rolling and collection operation.
- Grain bags MUST BE FREE of grain, mud, dirt debris, and vermin.
- To ensure used grain bags are eligible for recycling, grain bag collection services should be scheduled within one week of grain extraction.
- Grain bag collection services are offered free of charge

#### **Twine Recycling**



#### Details

Producers can pick up Clean Farms Twine Recycling Bags at any Lacombe Regional Waste Services Commission Transfer Site during regular business hours. Twine will only be accepted if it is placed in the Clean Farms Twine Recycling Bag, and then brought to the collection site.

#### Requirements

- Shake Remove as much debris, snow or ice as possible. Excessively dirty twine may be rejected, or subject to a landfill tipping fee or additional charges at drop off.
- 2. Bag Place loose twine in a Clean Farms Twine Recycling Bag and tie bags to close. Please do not knot the twine. Clean Farms Twine Recycling bags are available free of charge at any Lacombe Regional Waste Services Commission Transfer Sites.
- **3. Return** Return to a Lacombe Regional Waste Services Commission Transfer Site during regular business hours.







#### WHAT IS A BR&E AND BI&A?



# **DID YOU KNOW? Assessment**

#### THE 2024 PROPERTY ASSESSMENT INSPECTIONS

Property inspections for the 2025 tax year are being completed. Lacombe County is aware of new construction and significant renovations due to the development and safety codes permitting processes. We would also appreciate information provided about buildings where development and/or safety code permits were not requested. If you have demolished or removed homes, garages, sheds, or any other buildings and/or changed the usage of land and existing buildings please let us know so we can make the appropriate changes. We can not make a change to the assessment next year unless is it verified with a property inspection not later than early January.

#### **REQUESTS FOR INFORMATION**

Over the past several months, Lacombe County has sent requests for a variety of information validation of property sales/transfers, re inspections, and vacancy/occupancy confirmation. Most recently, letters requesting information regarding potentially assessable machinery and equipment and/or costs associated with new construction were mailed. If your response to a request for cost information is received after December 16, you may not be able to make a complaint against your assessment in 2025. You may email, fax, or drop your response off at the County Administration Office. If you have received any one of these letters and require clarification on how to be compliant or what you are being asked to remit, please contact an Assessor – one of us will be happy help you.

#### WHAT INFORMATION DO ASSESSORS REQUIRE?

Assessors must collect the necessary information to estimate market value or apply a regulated rate to prepare the assessment. Your cooperation in providing the necessary information is appreciated. This information may include: type of construction, size, age, other physical characteristics (i.e. heating type, plumbing fixtures, interior finish, basement finish, etc.), additional buildings/improvements, and the usage of the property. If an Assessor is unable to collect the necessary data when requested, an owners' ability to appeal an assessment may be affected. You have the right to appeal your assessment, however you cannot appeal a property tax levy.

#### **POSTAL STRIKE**

To avoid any potential penalties please ensure the County has both an up-to-date mailing and email address so we may contact you (your blue sign address may NOT be your mailing address). Looking forward, your contact details should be updated directly on you Certificate of Title with the Registry Office. The form to do this can be obtained from the County Administration Office. We appreciate your cooperation.

#### **NOTICE OF INSPECTIONS**

Lacombe County municipal Assessors are reviewing and visiting properties throughout the municipality this year as required to verify property information ensuring accurate and equitable assessments – we appreciate your cooperation with data collection activities. Our Assessors carry identification and will present it upon request. If you have questions or concerns, don't hesitate to get in touch with us at the Lacombe County Administration Office.

# Check your insurance to avoid invoices for fire department responses

Fall time means the start of a busier season is approaching, with increased traffic on roads, and heightened activity on local farms as the harvesting season starts. Lacombe County reminds you to review your insurance coverage and ensure your policies cover potential emergencies, which is crucial.

Under our updated Fire Protection and Emergency Response Bylaw, any person or business utilizing Lacombe County fire department services will receive an invoice for these services. This bylaw adjustment, which was implemented in January 2021, aligns with best practices and effectively supports our fire departments and community.

Specifically, the bylaw means that users of our fire department services,

whether due to a structure fire, grass fire, etc., or a motor vehicle accident or other emergency, will be charged for such services. Typically, these charges are covered through your insurance policy, provided you have the right coverage.

This approach aims to directly involve property and vehicle owners in the funding of our volunteer firefighters and fire department operations, eliminating the need to rely solely on taxpayer dollars. Many municipalities have adopted similar practices, recognizing the benefits of such a model.

Lacombe County encourages you to contact your insurance broker or company to ensure sufficient coverage for fire department response services.

# **APPLY TODAY: Community Program Grants available**

Lacombe County is committed to strengthening the quality of life for residents and fostering civic pride by providing financial support for community programs, events and activities.

Policy RC(9) - County Support of Community Programs, Events and Activities provides additional support for organizations in the County and its urban municipalities, as well as for the municipalities themselves. Support will be given for events and activities which are held for the benefit and enjoyment of the general public, demonstrate a financial need, and other criteria explained in the policy.

The application deadline is February 1, 2025; applicants will be advised by March 31st of the status of their application.

#### **Policy Guidelines/Procedures:**

**Eligibility**: Urban municipalities within the County, and community organizations in the urban municipalities within the County and within Lacombe County are eligible for funding, subject to the following guidelines:

To be eligible for consideration, programs:

- Must demonstrate a need for financial support from the County:
- Must be held for the enjoyment and benefit of the general public;
- Must be hosted on an annual basis and/or recognize significant milestone events;
- Must not charge an admission, entrance or registration fee for the program, event or activity;
- Must receive at least an equivalent amount of funding from the urban municipality in which the program, event or activity is being held as that being requested from the County;
- Must receive at-least an equal amount of funding from the community organization if the program, event or activity is being held in the County; and
- Must take place in the County, or in the urban municipalities within the County in 2024.


The following are not eligible for support under this policy:

- · capital facilities and equipment;
- youth and adult sports teams and associated programs, events and activities;
- school reunions;
- private functions;
- community organizations, programs, events and activities that receive support from the County through other programs or policies.

#### **Funding Allotment & Allocation:**

Funding will be based on \$0.75 per capita based on the current year official population of Lacombe County and the urban municipalities within the County, with a \$1,000 minimum allotment per town or village, and a \$500 minimum allotment per summer village.



# Taking action against domestic violence

**Important**: Your computer use can be monitored by others! Consider using a public computer or a friend's computer. If you search for escape on Google, make sure to clear your browsing history and cache.

In 2023, Alberta shelters received 59,000 calls for help from women looking to escape a difficult situation. **This is a 10-year high**. While more victims are seeking help and a way out, domestic violence is an increasing problem in Alberta. Often, victims don't know how to get out of that abusive situation, or they don't want to compromise their safety and the safety of their children. It is not just up to the victims to develop a plan to escape; if you can recognize the signs of abuse, you can help get a friend or family member out of a harmful domestic situation.

Domestic abuse can have significant impacts on victims' mental health and wellbeing, which they may have to face for years, such as scars, physical pain, anxiety and depression. We want to provide clear, actionable steps for anyone in Alberta experiencing domestic violence so they don't have to endure pain in the short and long term.

#### **RECOGNIZING DOMESTIC VIOLENCE**

The first step in leaving an abusive domestic relationship is recognizing the signs. What may seem normal or difficult to interpret in your relationship may actually be abuse. Whether it is emotional, psychological, physical or sexual abuse, you do not have to stay and suffer. If you think you might be a victim of domestic abuse, consider the following questions.

- Do you feel like you are unable to make decisions?
- Do they use intimidation or threats to make you do things?
- Do they grab, push, pinch, shove or hit you?
- Do they pressure you sexually?
- Are you prevented from doing things you want?
- Are they extremely possessive or get jealous easily?

Your answers to these questions might give you an indication that you are in an abusive relationship.

#### **ESCAPING DOMESTIC VIOLENCE**

Escaping domestic violence is a hard decision, and can be overwhelming. When you're preparing to leave, here are steps to take to leave safely.

#### Reach Out

Identify a safe friend, family member or organization that can offer a safe place to go.

#### Create A Plan

Have a safety plan to leave and put together a to-go bag with documents, money, and basic items

Gather Evidence

Try to bring any evidence of abuse or violence, such as threatening notes or photos of damage.

#### Seek Legal Help

Contact the court for information to prevent the abuser from contacting you.

#### Be Careful

While you prepare to leave this situation, it is important to be discrete to avoid an escalation. Have a separate, pre-paid cell phone, create copies of important documents and keys, save information and communicate on an unmonitored device.

#### **CREATING A SAFETY PLAN**

Leaving an abusive relationship can be dangerous, so it's important to have a safety plan in place.

A safety plan helps you prepare for the possibility of leaving quickly and under difficult circumstances. This plan should include the following:

**Identify Safe Places:** Know where you can go if you need to leave in a hurry. This could be a trusted friend's or family member's home or a local shelter.

**Gather Important Documents:** Keep essential documents like your ID, birth certificates, health records, and bank statements hidden in a secure place so you can grab them quickly when needed.

**Memorize Emergency Contacts:** Have key phone numbers memorized, including those for support services and shelters. Abusers may take your phone or prevent you from accessing it.

**Prepare a To-Go Bag:** Pack an emergency bag with clothes, medications, money, and essential items. You can store it at a friend's house or another safe location.

**Open a Bank Account:** If possible, open a bank account in your name and start setting aside money. Ensure your abuser is unaware by not having financial statements sent to your home.

**Plan Your Escape Route:** Know how to leave quickly and safely from your home or other locations. Rehearse these steps to ensure you're prepared in case of an emergency.

Bring Them With You: When you decide to leave, take your children if possible. If you try to get them later, the police cannot help you remove them from the other parent without a court order. This is the same with pets.

#### **IMPORTANT CONTACTS & RESOURCES**

Leaving a domestic violence situation is possible with the right plan and support. It's important for your safety to take the first step, no matter how daunting it may seem. You are not alone, and there are resources available to help you through this difficult time. If you or someone you know

is experiencing domestic violence, reach out to Alberta's Family Violence Info Line (310-1818) or contact local shelters for immediate assistance. Help is available.

There are many resources in Alberta designed to support people in abusive situations. Don't hesitate to reach out—help is available 24/7.

# AMENDING AGREEMENT FOR WASTEWATER TRUNK LINE FUNDING AGREEMENT

The County Manager was authorized to enter into an amending agreement with the Town of Blackfalds for the Wastewater Trunk Line Funding Agreement. The County's share of this project, \$1,321,685.28, will be funded from the Aspelund Wastewater Offsite Levy Reserve.

# LAKEVIEW ESTATES WATER FLUORIDE SYSTEM

The County Manager was directed to hire Hydrogeological Consultants to complete the drilling of a test well and subsequent studies at Lakeview Estates at an estimated cost of \$95,000, to be funded from the Water/Wastewater Reserve.

Lacombe County will provide support to the Town of Blackfalds in its application for Local Growth and Sustainability Grant funding for the Town of Blackfalds/Lacombe County Intermunicipal collaborative and cost-shared Broadway Avenue Water Reservoir Expansion project.

# FEDERATION OF CANADIAN MUNICIPALITIES (FCM) CONFERENCE ATTENDANCE

The County will send letters to the FCM with copies to Rural Municipalities of Alberta (RMA), Wheatland County, and MP Blaine Calkins, to express concern with how well the FCM's focus aligns with the unique needs and challenges of rural municipalities, specifically citing concerns related to the shipment of horses for live slaughter, clean oil, carbon capture, Bill 293, and the beef industry.

# AGRICULTURE SERVICE BOARD TOWN HALL

Council attended the Agriculture Service Board Town Hall virtually to receive updates related to initiatives of the Provincial Agriculture Service Board and the Assistant Deputy Minister of Agriculture and Irrigation.

#### FIRE DEPARTMENT RE-SPONSE INVOICE RELIEF REQUEST

Brandon Williams, a Lacombe County resident, provided a presentation regarding an invoice he received in the amount of \$2995 for a fire department response to a structure fire at his property on July 22, 2024. Mr. Williams expressed concern with the amount of the invoice and advised that more equipment and personnel attended the fire than were necessary. As such, Mr. Williams requested that the invoice be reviewed and adjusted.

Council received the presentation for information and directed the County Manager to provide a report and recommendation regarding this matter at a future Council meeting.
